

# VOTING RECORD 2009–2010 VERMONT

## YOUR LEGISLATORS' VOTING RECORD ON SMALL BUSINESS ISSUES

**2009–2010 SESSION:** Votes cast by members of the Vermont General Assembly on bills or amendments of particular interest to small business owners during the past legislative biennium are listed below. Although this Voting Record cannot reflect every deliberation that legislators take into consideration when casting a particular vote, this record serves as a guide for the purpose of evaluating lawmakers on their understanding of issues important to small business. Please thank those legislators who assisted our efforts to promote and protect the rights of our members to own, operate and grow their businesses.

### HOUSE BILLS:

**1 Economic Development Legislation—H.313:** Requires that the joint fiscal office prepare an economic impact assessment with each piece of legislation, stating whether the bill would have a positive, negative or neutral economic impact on private enterprise in Vermont. **A “Yes” vote supports the NFIB position.** The amendment failed 36–100.

**2 Decommissioning of Vermont Yankee—H.436:** Requires the owner of Vermont Yankee nuclear power plant to put up \$400–\$600 million in cash or financial guarantees to cover immediate decommissioning costs if its power facilities license is not renewed in 2012. Costs would be passed on to Vermont ratepayers in the form of increased electricity costs. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 85–52–12. The governor vetoed this bill and the legislative leadership chose not to challenge the veto, so the bill did not become law.

**3 Transportation Budget—H.438:** Removes provisions of the bill that increased the gas and diesel taxes. **A**

**“Yes” vote supports the NFIB position.** The amendment failed 34–109–6.

**4 General Fund Budget—H.441:** Raises more than \$28 million in new taxes by increasing the income tax, estate tax, capital gains tax and several splinter taxes, including tobacco, liquor, clothing, satellite TV and digital downloads. The bill did not significantly address the \$160 million unemployment compensation trust fund crisis and included a deficit for FY2010 projected to be \$67 million. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 94–52–3.

**5 Miscellaneous Tax Bill—H.442:** Imposes approximately \$55 million in additional taxes by increasing the income and estate taxes. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 84–53–12. Later in the 2009 session, \$28 million in new tax increases were included in H.441.

**6 Catamount Health Plan—H.444:** Expands the Catamount Health Plan, which NFIB views as a financially unsustainable program. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 130–2–17.

**7 Energy Legislation—H.446:** Mandates guaranteed power purchase rates for developers of wind, solar and hydro energy. The legislation ignored the potential upside from the near-term Clean Energy Fund and federal stimulus dollars, before promoting higher cost initiatives. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The legislation passed 92–42–15.

**8 Vermont Yankee—H.589:** Requires the owner of Vermont’s nuclear power station to establish two trust accounts, the first to support restoration of the industrial site to “greenfield condition” by depositing \$10 million by March 22, 2011. Requires another \$10 million by March 22, 2017, plus additional “sufficient funds” over time. These costs would have been passed on to ratepayers in the form of higher electricity costs. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** Although the House passed the bill 139–0–10, the bill died in the Senate.

**9 Menu Labeling—S.88:** Removes a provision that will accelerate the implementation of placing nutritional facts on menus in restaurants and similar establishments that are part of a chain with 20 or more locations doing business under the same name and offering the same menu items. Franchisees will be required to change all signage no later than Jan. 1. NFIB supported the elimination of this provision from S.88 because it places additional burdens on franchise owners of chain restaurants. **A “Yes” vote supports the NFIB position.** The amendment failed 36–98–15.

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**10 Healthcare Financing and Universal Access to Healthcare—S.88:** Requires the study of three options for healthcare reform. Vermont’s healthcare system has been studied for more than 20 years; we opposed the bill because the general fund appropriation in these recessionary economic times is not prudent. NFIB also called for overall healthcare costs and the financial sustainability of government programs to be addressed. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 91–42–16. Gov. Douglas did not sign S.88, citing his concerns; rather, he allowed it to become law without his signature.

## SENATE BILLS:

**1 Decommissioning of Vermont Yankee—H.436:** Requires the owner of Vermont Yankee to put \$400–\$600 million in cash or financial guarantees to cover immediate decommissioning costs if its power facilities license is not renewed in 2012. Costs would be passed on to Vermont ratepayers in the form of higher electricity costs in the future. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 22–4–4. The governor vetoed this bill and the legislative leadership chose not to challenge the veto; this was not enacted into law.

**2 General Fund Budget—H.441:** Raises more than \$28 million in new taxes by increasing the income tax, estate tax, capital gains tax and several splinter taxes, including tobacco, liquor, clothing, satellite TV and digital downloads. The bill did not significantly address the \$160 million unemployment compensation trust fund crisis and included a deficit for FY2010 projected to be \$67 million. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 27–3.

**3 Miscellaneous Tax Bill—H.442:** Imposes approximately \$55 million in additional taxes by increasing the

income and estate taxes. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 25–5. Later in the 2009 session, \$28 million in new tax increases were included in the passage of H.441.

**4 Catamount Health Plan—H.444:** Expands Catamount Health Plan, which NFIB views as a financially unsustainable program. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 24–0–5.

**5 Energy Legislation Amendment—H.446:** Guarantees rates for wind, solar and hydro energy. The legislation ignored the potential upside from the near-term Clean Energy Fund and federal stimulus dollars, before promoting higher cost initiatives. **A “Yes” vote supports the NFIB position.** The amendment failed 11–13–5.

**6 Energy Legislation—H.446:** Mandates guaranteed rates for wind, solar and hydro energy. The legislation ignored the potential upside from the near-term Clean Energy Fund and federal stimulus dollars, before promoting higher cost initiatives. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The legislation passed 16–10–3.

**7 Vermont Yankee—S.289:** Decides whether to allow the Vermont Public Service Board to continue their work through the quasi-judicial process, for the purposes of issuing a Certificate of Public Good for another 20 years of continued operation by Vermont Yankee. We support the continued operation of Vermont Yankee as long as it is safe and reliable beyond March 21, 2012, because of the positive impact on Vermont’s economy, as well as the nearly 1,300 combined jobs created at the plant and regionally due to the plant’s operation. Although the Senate passed S.289, the bill died in the House. **A “Yes” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill failed 4–26.

**8 Healthcare Reform & Menu Labeling—S.88:** Accelerates the implementation of placing nutritional facts on menus in restaurants and similar establishments that are part of a chain with 20 or more locations doing business under the same name and offering for sale substantially the same menu items. Franchisees will be required to change all signage no later than Jan. 1. Additionally, this legislation requires the continued study of Vermont’s healthcare system. Vermont’s healthcare system has been studied for more than 20 years; we opposed the bill because of the menu labeling provision and the imprudent general fund appropriation for the healthcare study. NFIB advocated for overall healthcare costs and financial sustainability of government programs to be addressed. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** The bill passed 25–4. Gov. Douglas did not sign S.88, citing his concerns. Instead, he allowed the bill to become law without his signature.

**9 Misclassification of Employees—H.647:** Requires an increase in penalties and fines incurred by businesses that misclassify employees as independent contractors. Does not include a uniform definition of an “independent contractor,” nor does it establish a study to more clearly define the term, making it difficult for business owners to report proper classification. **A “No” vote supports the NFIB position.** This bill passed 21–5.
