ALBANY, NY (11/12/2010)(readMedia)-- In a major victory for New York State in litigation of national significance, a recent State appellate court ruling upheld New York law requiring Internet retailers to collect sales tax on sales to New York customers.

The Court concluded that the State's new law is constitutionally sound "on its face" – that is – legal and enforceable with respect to Internet retailers whose business practices bring them within the scope of the law, unless a retailer can make a valid legal challenge to the statute as applied to its own unique factual circumstances.

"This is a victory not only for the State, but for all of its "Main Street" retailers who employ New Yorkers, pay property taxes, and contribute in other ways to the local community," noted Jamie Woodward, Acting Commissioner of the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance. "Until this law was enacted, some Internet retailers had an unfair price advantage because they did not collect sales tax."
